




# What a difference a year makes

As April 2015 began, it saw us with our heads down, digging into the detailed and difficult work that would become our submission to National Energy Board's review of Kinder Morgan's proposed pipeline and tanker project. The review process was flawed and questionable, yet having your voice—the local voice—heard by the regulator, as it contemplated its recommendations on a project that could so negatively impact our region, was crucial.

At the same time, we found ourselves working at the local level with our green boating initiatives. We were partnering with businesses around the region to improve the health of our waters through practical solutions for boaters and marinas that protect marine life—and we've seen the impact of this work grow. There was a 31 per cent increase in the number of Clean Marine BC-certified facilities this past year alone.

We were also focused on our ongoing efforts to build a new way to plan and manage our waterfronts, developing a collaborative model with local expertise that we hope to bring to other communities in the region in the years to come.

# **CLEAN MARINE BC**

During this year, the Clean Marine certification program celebrated its 20th year in Canada. At the National Clean Marine Conference in Ontario, we presented the BC regional award to the False Creek Harbour Authority in recognition of this facility being the first—and the only—one in the province to achieve a 5-anchor rating; the highest possible in the Clean Marine BC program.

Across the province, the program continues to expand, with a growing number of facilities achieving certification and entering to enroll in the eco-certification process. The program encourages environmental best practices at marinas, yacht clubs, boatyards and harbour authorities in order to lessen the impact of recreational boating on marine life.



## **OVER THE PAST YEAR, WE HAVE:**

- **Earned** the President's Award from the Environmental Managers Association of BC for our program's role in safeguarding the marine environment and cruising waters. This is a prestigious award that recognizes superior environmental stewardship by an individual or organization in the community.
- Expanded the number of <u>Clean Marine BC-certified</u> <u>members</u> by 50 per cent. Currently, there are 42 marinas, yacht clubs, wharves and boatyards that are certified and/ or enrolled in the program.
- **Certified** five new facilities: Cedar Grove Marina, Ladysmith Maritime Society Marina, Quayside Marina, Vancouver Marina, and the West Vancouver Yacht Club's Fisherman's Cove. This brings the total to 21, which is 31 per cent more than last fiscal year.
- Continued our membership in the Pacific Oil Spill
  Prevention Education Team (POSPET), a working group of
  the Pacific States British Columbia Oil Spill Task Force.
  POSPET has a mandate to certify environmentally sound
  marinas and clean harbour authorities, and to collaborate
  on industry best practices and small fuel spill prevention.
- Advocated for a solution to abandoned and derelict vessels that threaten our coast, and we've seen progress! All levels of government across the party lines are working towards a comprehensive plan to deal with abandoned vessels, and Georgia Strait Alliance will continue to ensure that happens.

We spoke out for action at Ladysmith's 'Concern for Our Harbour Rally' and helped to ensure the removal of the derelict vessel Viki Lyne II



# **WATERFRONT INITIATIVE**


In 2015, the Waterfront Initiative continued to build the groundwork necessary to advance the facilitation of cross-sector collaboration, targeted research, and integrated planning in order to protect and improve the Vancouver waterfront.

## **OVER THE PAST YEAR, WE HAVE:**

- Increased the Waterfront Network by 20 per cent yearover-year to more than 200 individuals from 60+ organizations. There has also been growth in the network in previously under-represented sectors from local government and academia, which means we are strengthening the diversity of voices and unlocking new ideas and resources to affect change.
- Hosted three stakeholder forums that brought together representatives from varying levels of government (including First Nations), the industrial and commercial sectors, as well as environmental groups and civil society. Areas discussed include identifying the issues facing the waterfront, how the work of partner organizations would continue, and what indicators are most meaningful to measure the health of the waterfront from social, economic, and environmental perspectives.
- **Published** the 'Comprehensive Assessment of Data Reflecting Vancouver's Waterfront' report, which outlines quantifiable markers that express the overall health of Vancouver's waterfront in relationship to transportation, access to nature, living and working on the waterfront,

and the diversity and abundance of ecosystems. These areas and the tools to measure them were identified in consultation with stakeholders and through careful reviews of relevant management plans. This information will be used to create a 'State of the Waterfront' report in early 2017, which will become a crucial resource to guide planning and decision making in the future.

• **Celebrated** our third annual Water's Edge Day, which had a 30 per cent increase in attendance. In partnership with the Vancouver Maritime Museum, more than 1200 people gathered at the shoreline for fun, free, family-friendly activities, including First Nations canoe tours, kayaking, harbour tours, bird walks, children's activities and art workshops.

# **TANKERS & SPILLS**

**Hard work bearing fruit has characterized our Tankers & Spills work this year.** After years of advocacy, both the provincial and federal governments are recognizing the need for greater accountability and community involvement in oil spill planning and response—and our work is now about follow through, ensuring that policy reforms are as strong as they can be.

As we entered the critical final year of the Kinder Morgan review, we won a new opportunity for the public to have their say, and every day the momentum to stop this risky project and to choose a different future for our region is growing. Together, we are helping to protect coastal communities and the Strait of Georgia from the threat of oil spills and from the risks inherent in new fossil fuel projects that threaten our province and its waters.



## **OVER THE PAST YEAR, WE HAVE:**

- Won motion A4, which calls for strengthened local oil spill preparedness and greater involvement from communities in federal and provincial oil spill planning. The motion was passed unanimously at the Union of BC Municipalities Convention in September 2015. This victory built on work throughout the year to support the resolution being passed first by the City of Vancouver, and then at the Lower Mainland Local Government Association.
- Helped to ensure the Prime Minister kept his promise to strengthen the Kinder Morgan review process by coordinating an open letter with 100 signatories requesting the Prime Minister follow through on his campaign trail commitment to redo the Kinder Morgan pipeline review. We also commissioned independent polling that revealed 68 per cent of BC residents expected the Prime Minister to follow through on that election promise; and we created a suite of tools that easily allowed the public to call on the Prime Minister to strengthen the Kinder Morgan review.
- **Shaped** the development of new spill response laws for BC. Politicians drew on our expertise and briefing materials as they debated the bill in the Legislature, and our constructive criticism of the new law impacted the public conversation through an <u>op-ed</u> in a major provincial newspaper.
- Succeeded in making the Kinder Morgan pipeline expansion a vote-determining issue in the federal election, by engaging candidates in coastal ridings with a <u>survey</u> about their views on the review process, and by providing voters

with information on their candidates' views on key coastal issues. Thirty-five federal candidates responded to our survey, 12 of whom were elected.

- **Testified** to the National Energy Board. In Georgia Strait Alliance's role as an official intervenor, we submitted a <u>final written argument</u> and gave <u>oral testimony</u> directly to panel members. Our case demonstrated the lack of preparedness for additional oil spill risks that are associated with Kinder Morgan's pipeline expansion project, and showed that the project carries unjustifiable impacts on the endangered southern resident killer whale population.
- **Demonstrated** the risk of a spill to communities along the Georgia Strait by publishing research reports showing the impact of an oil spill on BC coastal communities (Oil Spills in your Backyard), and on oil spill response policy (A Voice for Coastal Communities in Marine Oil Spill Preparedness); and by organizing a workshop, led by world-renowned oil spill expert Dr. Riki Ott, on the public health impacts associated with oil spills and response gaps in the wake of the Marathassa spill in English Bay.





# **OCEAN LITERACY**

An important part of what we do is outreach that engages and connects our messages with communities around the region. Our impact and our ability to discuss key issues of concern broadens as we leverage platforms that range from digital to news media to in-person speaking opportunities, and we are proud to be bringing new stewards who want to protect the Strait into our initiatives.

# **OVER THE PAST YEAR, WE HAVE:**

- Partnered with the <u>Vancouver Festival of Ocean Films</u> to bring hundreds of film and ocean lovers together to celebrate our oceans and to reflect on the global issues that our waters currently face.
- **Presented** at events throughout the region, including the <u>Salish Sea Ecosystem Conference</u> in Vancouver and to Vancouver high school students in their law class.
- **Co-hosted** an evening with the SeaDoc Society's Dr. Joe Gaydos, who spoke about his new book: The Salish Sea: Jewel of the Pacific.
- Led shoreline clean ups in Nanaimo at Swy-A-Lana Lagoon, and in Richmond at Iona Park in partnership with RBC employees.



# **SPECIES PROTECTION**

Our initiatives at gaining protection for the most vulnerable species are woven throughout many of our programs. We focus our efforts on ensuring the devastating impacts of pollution, such as oil spills of all sizes, are mitigated and that increasing threats from catastrophic spills are avoided.

This past year, we also continued to deepen our partnerships by working with scientists and communities to better understand the growing pollution risks to orcas and other species at risk, and to identify concrete solutions to contaminants that threaten the environment of marine mammals.

In addition, we continued to raise concerns about the region's growing shipping traffic that is pushing at risk species to the brink of extinction, particularly the endangered southern resident orca whose population currently totals 84. Unfortunately, there continues to be no effective leadership plan from the government that would balance economic interests with the health of local ocean residents, which means we'll continue to engage and advocate for action plans that will make a difference to at-risk species.



## **OVER THE PAST YEAR, WE HAVE:**

- Participated in the preliminary environmental review process on the proposed expansion of the Roberts Bank Terminal 2 project, with a particular focus on raising issues of concern about the project's impacts on southern resident orcas.
- **Celebrated** four southern resident baby orcas and a rise in the number of this population to 84.
- **Collaborated** with the Vancouver Aquarium's <u>Ocean Pollution Research Program</u> to co-host a cross-section of scientists, academics, non-profits and managers to identify solutions to ocean contaminants that impact our at-risk marine mammals.
- Re-engaged with our partners on efforts to have the <u>National Marine Conservation Area</u> in the Southern Strait of Georgia formally created.
