



# CLEAN MARINE BC

Moving the dial to restore the region's water and air quality

#### THIS YEAR, GEORGIA STRAIT ALLIANCE HAS:

**Enrolled three new <u>facilities</u>** into the CMBC program: the Harbour Authority of Squamish, Sidney Island Community Dock, and Spruce Harbour Marina in downtown Vancouver.



## Reached new communities

By adding new facilities, GSA is taking its path to adoption of more environmentally-conscious boating practices to new audiences.

**Collaborated on solutions** to the threats from aquatic invasive species, and abandoned and wrecked vessels with the Invasive Species Council of BC, the Boating BC Association, and the BC Ministry of Environment & Climate Change.



# Built key relationships

By workshopping solutions with key decision makers, GSA is demonstrating that we are a collaborative organization that can be counted on to provide input on solutions-based initiatives that support marine conservation.

## Got the message out there!

By participating, GSA is spreading the green boating message to thousands of boaters, who are the target audience for this program that can impact marine conservation.

### Environmental improvements at CMBC-certified facilities have included:

- ✓ Installing pump-out stations and greywater recycling
- ✓ Replacing old popcorn foam docks with HDPE encapsulated foam
- ✓ Upgrading to concrete docks and removing old treated timber floats
- ✓ Upgrading from creosote timber pilings to steel
- ✓ Upgrading vessel maintenance areas to prevent contaminant runoff
- ✓ Installing secondary containment around used oil recycling
- ✓ Installing energy-efficient windows and lighting
- ✓ Installing low-flow bathroom and kitchen fixtures

# WATERFRONT INITIATIVE

Fostering an understanding and stewardship of the marine environment

Modelled on New York City's tremendously successful Waterfront Alliance, the Waterfront Initiative is a network of 200+ waterfront stakeholders in Vancouver. It includes all levels of government including First Nations, as well as industry, academia and citizens, and it is led by Georgia Strait Alliance. Its objective is to facilitate conversations and solutions with cross- sector stakeholders to address the fact that there is no comprehensive management and action plan in place for Vancouver's waterfront.

### THIS YEAR, GEORGIA STRAIT ALLIANCE HAS:

Released the first-ever State of the Waterfront for Vancouver! We analyzed data that considers social, economic and environmental elements in five thematic areas:

- 1. Living on the waterfront
- 2. Working on the waterfront
- 3. Water-based transportation
- 4. Access to the water
- 5. Ecosystems

# Promoted understanding

By measuring and tracking five key trends, GSA created a baseline to demonstrate the health and status of Vancouver's waterfront that can be referenced by residents and policymakers to understand how Vancouver's shoreline is evolving.

# TANKERS & SPILLS

Raising awareness of the links between the health of ecosystems and human communities

Georgia Strait Alliance has expanded its work to defend coastal communities and marine life from the negative impacts of fossil fuel projects and the risk of oil spills. We have an increased presence on the Sunshine Coast, organizing people-powered campaigns that build community and take action to address climate change and seek climate accountability at the local level.



#### THIS YEAR, GEORGIA STRAIT ALLIANCE HAS:

Held public meetings in Vancouver, Victoria and Sechelt to build community support for a fossil fuel moratorium to protect our coast, and we created community action teams in **Sechelt and Gibsons** to consolidate support and advocate for measures to improve climate accountability.



#### **Empowered** communities

Through grassroots initiatives, GSA is supporting coastal communities to raise their voices about the dangers and climate consequences of bringing new fossil fuel projects online, and to deal with the climate consequences we are already facing.

Mobilized supporters to take part in a 10,000-people strong demonstration to defend our coast, land and climate from the Transmountain pipeline project.



# Amplified our opposition

By working with a larger coalition, the opposition to the Transmountain project was amplified and the Texas oil company, Kinder Morgan, abandoned its plans to expand the pipeline.







Mobilized more than 2,700 requests from supporters asking the Province for an independent review of Kinder Morgan installing anti-spawning mats in BC rivers without permits.



# Mobilized for action

By creating a consolidated and direct request for action, the BC government assigned the matter to the BC Oil and Gas Commission to conduct a review.

**Met with Environment & Climate Change** Minister George Heyman on multiple occasions, ensuring that our supporters' strong opposition to the Trans Mountain project—as well as the reasons why—was heard and understood.



# Built key relationships

By developing relationships with key decision makers and engaging directly with them on a regular basis, GSA is able to leverage insights and pressure points to show the provincial government that it must stand firm against the Transmountain expansion.

# SPECIES PROTECION

Protecting the diversity of wildlife and their habitat

With funding in place to increase staff to fulltime on our Species Protection file, Georgia Strait Alliance has had tremendous success! Work has focused on protecting Southern Resident orcas and removing fish farms from BC waters.





"This past year was a shining example of GSA's ability to achieve big results. We focussed our relatively limited resources on strategic priorities: we advanced the issue of species protection in the Salish Sea as a 'dinner table topic' and made important inroads with various levels of government. #### THIS YEAR, GEORGIA STRAIT ALLIANCE HAS:

**Established a team of allies** by forming a coalition with World Wildlife Fund Canada, David Suzuki Foundation, Raincoast Conservation Foundation, and Natural Resources Defense Council to advocate and increase pressure on the federal government to protect Southern Resident orcas.



# Amplified our opposition

By working together, this orca coalition—represented legally by Ecojustice—issued a petition to the federal ministers of Fisheries and Environment & Climate Change to request an Emergency Order to protect orcas.



# Empowered our supporters to take action

By leveraging this group of over 1,140 people, GSA facilitated members to participate in letter-writing campaigns to DFO, with specific requests for orca recovery actions; to take part in public consultation opportunities and salmon surveys; and to sign the petition demanding an Emergency Order.
